Step Afrika! shares history of keeping the beat

Syncopated stomping, African chanting and choreographed hand-claps are part of the energy coming to the dance floor when Step Afrika! performs this weekend in the Virgin Islands.

The first show happens at 8 p.m. today at Island Center on St. Croix, followed at 8 p.m. Saturday at Reichhold Center.

Step Afrika! will hold their second residency at 10 a.m. today at Island Center.

Stepping is a style of dance rooted in African heritage, made popular by black fraternities and sororities in the early 1900s.

Using a series of geometric formations, dancers keep a cadence with their feet, accentuating beats with unified choreography reminiscent of the military.

Founder Brian Williams, a Howard graduate and Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity member, went to South Africa in 1991 for a fellowship and recognized a similar style of the dance.

"He saw a young boy doing some gumboot and thought it was a little odd because it had a lot of the same characteristics of stepping," Giani Clarkson, Step Afrika company manager, said. "There is a serious bridge between what African-Americans and Africans know as stepping."

Gumboot dancing developed in the mines of South Africa, where workers created dances with their boots and bodies to keep their spirits up in response to oppressive working conditions and apartheid.

Williams started a festival that brought both groups together to perform and later founded his own company in Washington, D.C.

In 1994, Step Afrika became the

first professional dance company focused strictly on the art of stepping.

"We've gone from a local sensation to an international phenomenon. We travel all over the world to 150 events and travel to foreign countries reaching over 75,000 people," Clarkson said. "We're entertainers and educators."

The company is made up of eight college graduates — four men and four women.

Graduation from college or university is a requirement for membership, and the company makes it pick from auditions held throughout the nation.

"We just want people who have a love of stepping and want to be ambassadors of culture," Clarkson Our show is basically a history lesson of how stepping arrived in the Americas ...

said. "We interact so well and we always want to make the audience feel a part of what we're doing."

The company has danced in places as far away as Brazil and Tanzania, and it will be going to Vietnam this summer.

"Our show is basically a history lesson of how stepping arrived in the Americas, from the pledge scene on college campuses, to the South African gumboot mines, to an African Zulu celebration, and to here, where stepping has taken on a contemporary vibe," Clarkson said. "We're about preserving the culture of stepping and using stepping as a tool for children to get them into in college and higher education."

Saturday night, the company will showcase about seven dances.

The opening number, "KeNako," is inspired by the com-

pany's time in Johannesburg, South Africa. During the piece, dancers step along to the metronome in perfect timing.

"The Pledge Scene" showcases the different styles of stepping used by African-America fraternities and sororities.

In a dance called "Work," choreographed by Jackie Semela, the South African gumboot style is shown.

And "Shh" highlights the unique stepping styles in each of black fraternities and sororities.

"They all have a distinct stepping style, with different postures, the way the arms move, calls, beats, and changes," Clarkson said.

The performance is strictly percussive.

"If you've got a body you've got music. You roll from there," he said. "The only music is maybe a drum."

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She migrated to the U.S. in the late '80s and began writing her own compositions. Denise "Saucy Wow" Belfon is a soca, R&B and gospel singer, songwriter and dancer. She is commonly known by Caribbean locals as the "soca-dancehall queen" because of her high energy, complex, exotic on stage performances in addition to her powerful, husky, and high stamina vocals. Her career, although very well established, exploded after the release of her 2003 smash single, "Saucy Baby," which is considered to be her signature song by many.

Songstress Cherine Anderson will treat audiences to dancehall soul a mixture of reggae, dancehall, soul and R&B, laced with the grittiness of her past. She is a singer, songwriter and acclaimed Jamaican actress who has starred in two of Jamaica's most successful films, Dancehall Queen (1997) and One Love (2003).

Popular songs include "Good Love" and "Kingston State of Mind."

Growing up in the church, she became a touring member of Ashe Performing Arts Ensemble, and in 2003. Anderson's voice lent two heartfelt songs to the soundtrack of One Love, which earned her the MTV2/Urbanworld Film Festival Award for best actress in a feature film.

She has a bachelor of arts in film and music and a minor in Japanese language and literature from Middlebury College and has held numerous internships at entertainment companies such as MTV

Haiti to Brooklyn, NY. In 1987, he joined a rap group with his cousin Prakazrel Michel (aka Pras) and Michel's high-school classmate Lauren Hill. They initially called themselves the Tranzlator Crew, which evolved into the Fugees, a name taken from slang for Haitian refugees. They signed with Ruffhouse Records in 1993 and released their debut album, "Blunted on Reality," in 1994.

The Fugees hit their stride in 1996 on their second release, The Score, produced by Jean. The album went triple-platinum, garnering two Grammy Awards and selling six million copies nationally and 20 million internationally. Jean assembled or participated in numerous high-profile charity benefit events for multiple causes including aid for his native Haiti.

He launched his solo album "The Carnival," in 1997, which garnered a Grammy nomination and featured a roster of guests including Pras, Lauryn Hill, Jean's siblings, Celia Cruz, the Neville Brothers and Bob Marley's female backing vocalists the I Threes. It hit Billboard's Top 20 and went triple-platinum.

Hidden Beach NAACP Image Award nominated saxophonist Mike Phillips has been entertaining audiences with his genre-blending sax play and the help of notable artists from an array of musical arenas. They include contemporary jazz luminaries the likes of Wayman Tisdale, Jonathan Butler and Jeff

In 1985, Freddie Jackson landed a recording contract with Capitol Records, and issued his debut album, Rock Me Tonight. The Laurence-penned title track stormed the R&B charts, spending six weeks at number one, and made Jackson an instant hit on urban contemporary radio. "You Are My Lady" gave him a second straight R&B charttopper, and also proved to be his highest-charting single on the Billboard Hot 100, peaking at number 13. With "He'll Never Love You (Like I Do)" and "Love Is Just a Touch Away" also hitting the R&B Top Ten, Rock Me Tonight topped the R&B album chart and went platinum. Jackson issued the follow-up Just Like the First Time 1986, on the heels of a number one R&B duet with Melba Moore, "A Little Bit More" (from her album A Lot of Love). Another platinum seller, Just Like the First Time continued Jackson's dominance of the R&B singles charts; "Tasty Love," "Have You Ever Loved Somebody," and "Jam Tonight" all hit number one, while "I Don't Want to Lose Your Love" went to number two.

After returning to the charts with "It's Your Move" in February 2004, Jackson released his tenth studio album, "Transitions," in September 2006 under the record label Orpheus Music.

As a Grammy and American Music Award-winning recording artist with five best-selling albums and ten Billboard No. 1 singles, it's evident that Stephanie Mills' impact over the last 25 years has not gone unnoticed

Using the same "Playground" riddim Beenie used for "Who Am I," Clifford "Mr. Vegas" Smith recorded the hectic "Nike Air," an instant Jamaican hit, according to All Music Guide. As soon as "Nike Air" hit the top of the charts, "Heads High" was issued and became a smash not only on the island but the U.K. as well. The singer was now

called upon to accompany crooners like Sean Paul, since producers assumed Vegas was a quick, forceful toaster with no croon of his own. He finally got to show some of his lover side when his debut full-length on the Greensleeves label, Heads High, hit the streets in 1998. Damn Right appeared in 2001 with Shaggy and Big Yard guesting and a bit more R&B and hip-hop flavor. The Eastern-flavored "Pull Up" became Vegas' next big hit and the title track to his 2004 album for his new label, Delicious Vinyl.
